The Queenstown Lakes District Council appreciates the opportunity to submit on the tenure review proposal for The Larches pastoral lease. The Council has an interest in tenure review proposals within this District for four primary reasons:

- ensuring sufficient public access is provided;
- ensuring indigenous biodiversity values are identified and managed appropriately;
- ensuring heritage values are recognised and provided for;
- ensuring outstanding natural landscapes, outstanding natural features and other significant visual amenities are protected.

The Council wishes to raise the following matters:

1. Mt Barker Road.

Mt Barker legal road finishes within the boundary of this lease. A private road currently extends through to Cardrona Valley Road. Council requests consideration be given to extending the legal road through the site to connect Mt Barker Road with Cardrona Valley Road.

Reasons:

- a) The Council believes this would improve access for residents in the Mt Barker area by providing them with an alternative access route that would significantly improve travel times when heading west.
- b) This would improve access to the subject area for visitors travelling from Wanaka or from Queenstown via the Crown Range.

2. Public Access.

The Council is supportive of moves to increase public access in the District through the creation of walking and cycling trails and is working with the Upper Clutha Tracks Trust to achieve that end. The Upper Clutha Tracks Trust is a non profit organisation working towards promoting, supporting, funding and advocating the establishment of a functional and high quality network of trails. The Council is uncertain from the proposal as to how this will fit into the wider network of trails in the area. In particular the Council wishes to ensure that freeholding land through this process will not act as an impediment to the creation of a wider network of trails in the Cardrona valley including a proposed Cardrona – Wanaka trail.

Reasons:

- a) The community have identified the need to create a walking/cycling trail linking Wanaka and Cardrona. A trail linking Wanaka and Cardrona would make a significant addition to the network of walking / cycling trails being developed in the District.
- b) The route of this trail would pass through the area proposed for freeholding as part of this process which may be an impediment to its development.
- c) The proposal should improve access to the Criffel diggings which would facilitate community access to an interesting historic area. There is however, some uncertainty of the ability of this proposal to link with trails running along the tops of the Criffel range.
- 3. The Council has concerns about the resources which the Department of Conservation have been allocated for the ongoing maintenance and development of the substantial areas of pastoral lease land that have been acquired thorough the tenure review process.

Reasons:

a) The Council has concerns regarding the ability of the Department of Conservation to manage weed and pest species in these areas in the long term given the lack of additional funding or any evidence of a management plan to administer the increase in the area of these lands that the department is responsible for.

Submission in relation to the Tenure Review Po254 "the Larches".

To whom it may concern,

We also submitted as part of a 4 family submission dated 4th September 2008. We question the need for another access point to the conservation area for reasons explained in the 4 family submission.

We do not object to the Tenure Review on the Larches itself. Our objection is the access route from Mt. Barker road to the track.

As part of the Tenure Review on the Larches, access to a (still to be created) walking track is proposed on a legal road right next to our property. This will create a huge invasion of our privacy and that of our neighbours. It will also have an impact on the "remoteness experience" of the track users. They will not feel comfortable walking the track that intrudes on other peoples privacy (see enclosed aerial shot of 3 of the properties with the legal road/proposed track marked in red).

When we bought our property 3 years ago we were aware of the fact that a legal road was right next to our property. We made enquiries at the time as to find out what the plans for this road were, but neither the Queenstown Lakes District Council, the Otago Regional Council nor the Department of Conservation were able to tell us why a legal road was located there. We were given the impression that there were heaps of legal roads everywhere that never got used and would disappear in time. A map given to us at the time showed indeed legal roads that no longer exist and/or were never formed. Even the latest up to date map given to us by the council showed roads that no longer excist.

It surprises me that the Queenstown Lakes District Council aproved the building platforms at the time when there was a possibility that the paper roads were going to be used. At no time was the purpose of this road mentioned.

Although we heard vague rumours about the plans for the track we were not able to get proper information.


Hence our surprise when the Tenure Review proposal arrived and our indignation when only given 2 weeks to respond. The Tenure Review discussion on the property involved has been going on for some 15 years but not with all affected parties. We have not been consulted whatsoever and find this a huge breach of natural justice.

We strongly object to the access route mentioned above and request proper consultation and information as more workable alternatives are at hand.

If this is of such high landscape value to the region, why is only a small area of the hillside covered under a conservation covenant?

Why is the wetland, immediately above CC1, not included in CC1?
